More than 10,000 Kiwis answered, of all ages, from around the country.

Methodology & Approach



METHODOLOGY

The survey ran from 8 - 31 October 2021.

Questions were curated by Stuff in conjunction with Pathfinder Asset Management.

Survey Monkey was utilised with quota sampling.

Promoted across stuff.co.nz via editorial and advertising, Neighbourly, Stuff regional, metropolitan, community, and Sunday newspapers, and email marketing.

Total starts: 10,525 and 10,262 completions (response rate 97.5%)


Average time spent on survey 3:47.



16 questions were asked in the rivery covering the environment, climate change and sustainability, and including demographic questions on

- Age
- Gender
- Household income
- Region
- Ethnicity.

A summary.

The immediacy of the problem and the existential threat of climate change is paramount and it's a challenge that needs to be tackled collaboratively by society.

However, when it comes to taking action at an individual level, not all are making changes to lifestyle, home or how they live.



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Key Takeaways.



Urgency

Almost three-quarters of respondents (74%) believe we need to act immediately to combat climate change.



Collective effort

4 out of 5 respondents (82%) see climate change as a problem that needs to be solved by individuals, governments and communities all working together.



A threat to society

Almost as many respondents (43%) see climate change as the biggest threat to society as Covid-19, social inequality and housing affordability combined (46%).



We can do better

Over half of respondents (56%) believe NZ is not doing enough to combat climate change.

When it comes to taking action at an individual level, not all respondents are making changes to their lifestyle, home or how they live.

Food Shopping Habits

62%

of female shoppers are likely to take climate change and/or the environment into account, compared to 51% of males. Nelson and Marlborough had the highest number of shoppers who took environmental and/or climate impacts into account when making food or beverage choices.

Politics

More than half of the respondents take climate change into consideration when voting - with the younger generation having the highest representation. 68% of respondents take climate change into consideration when voting.

Residents from Auckland, Tasman, Nelson, and Otago are most likely to consider an employer's sustainability efforts when applying for jobs.

Travel

How much do Kiwis take into account the impact on the environment and climate change when we book our holidays? **46%**

of respondents take climate and environmental impacts into account when booking their travel. A household's income doesn't influence travel decisions based on on climate change or the environment. The Nelson, Tasman, and Otago regions had the highest proportion of residents who took into account the impact of their travels on the environment or climate change.

Authority

Is climate change a problem for the individual or an issue government, communities and individuals need to address as a whole? 82% believe that it's an issue

solved by the government, communities, and individuals. of respondents don't believe that climate change is a joint issues for all 3 groups.
