NZers living in sunny coastal areas are happier

Half of Kiwis say they are happy, with Hawke's Bay and Nelson residents feeling the happiest



Special attention needs to be paid to Auckland

The number of Kiwis that are unhappy have doubled in the last 2 months however it's Aucklanders that are least happy — only 2 in 5 (vs. 3 in 5 for whole of Aotearoa). Financial worries are hitting hard in this region as Aucklanders complain about cost of living and the housing crisis.



More needs to be done to alleviate cost of living crisis

Cost of living is currently the biggest concern for Kiwis, even more so for Aucklanders. Housing affordability, access to good healthcare, climate change and traffic round out the top 5 concerns for NZers.



NZers need to know why they should care about local elections

While 8 in 10 NZers say they are likely to vote in the upcoming local elections, for those that aren't, the main reasons for not are having no one to vote for and a lack of care for politics.



Candidates need to connect better with voters to earn trust

Only 2 in 10 Kiwis trust their local MPs. The majority also do not feel represented by candidates in their areas, main reason being out of touch with everyday Kiwis



How is New Zealand doing?

Half of Kiwis say they are happy.

This is because of their great family and friends, being thankful for their health and life just generally being 'good' at the moment.






Those that are unhappy have almost doubled in number since June

For the 1 in 5 that are unhappy, it's mainly because of the current cost of living situation, complaints about the government and rising crime.

This has increased significantly (almost doubled) since Stuff measured the mood of the nation in Jun'22 (12% Jun'22 vs. 20% Aug'22).







Where do the happiest New Zealanders live?

Hawke's Bay and Nelson residents are the happiest. Oppositely, Aucklanders are least happy — only 2 in 5.

The report will shed some light on the systemic issues Aucklanders are making so many of the population unhappy.







What are Aucklanders unhappy about?

Financial worries are hitting hard in this region as Aucklanders complain about cost of living and the housing crisis.

In addition, they are worried about rise in crime. Many blame the government for the current situation they find themselves in.





How many Kiwis are on the move?

1 in 4

Kiwis (aged 18+) are planning to move in the next 5 years

...because it's getting expensive where they live whereas others want to move closer to family.



Q. Do you plan on leaving [REGION] in the next 5 years? Base: Total = 5833 Q. Why do you say that? Base: Those that said yes = 1400

Who is more likely to move in the next 5 years?

18-34 year olds are most likely to move away from their regions in the next 5 years — mostly to either work or travel abroad or to be able to buy a house in NZ where it's less expensive.

The main population centers Wellington and Auckland don't seem to provide a quality of living that encourages people to stay.




How likely are New Zealanders to vote in the upcoming local elections?



8 in 10 (79%) New Zealanders say they are likely to vote. It seems the intention is there however since the nationwide restructuring of local government in 1989, turnout has declined from 57% to 42.2% in 2019.

"Local government is our primary level of democracy. It provides a mechanism for people to participate in local public affairs and have a say in the way in which their communities are run and the local public services they receive. It also enables people to learn about democracy through practice and become active citizens in their own right." LGNZ





Kiwis have trust issues when it comes to their local MPs

Political trust has been linked to voter turnout — this may explain why voting turnout is much lower than intention.


Local MP's should look to build trust within the regions however recent allegations of bullying from both Labour and National is hindering that.

Local candidates don't seem to inspire and break through the barrier of indifference.


Candidates have to show their voters why they should care.

What did we do?



We designed a 5
minute online
survey that was
advertised via
Stuff's and The
Spinoff's channels
(website, eDM etc.)



The survey was live 12th – 28th of August.



We spoke to more than 5,500 New Zealanders and weighted the data to reflect nationally representative samples for gender, age and region.
